That change was made in direct response to feedback from readers. We have also changed some aspects of design to improve the readability of the magazine, again based on feedback.

We hope to present you with authoritative guides to some of the most important ideas, experiments and developments. For example, next month's issue will look at the many facets of neutrinos, including new and upcoming experiments. But perhaps there is a topic that you would like to see discussed in greater depth, whether related to future progress of the field, or some existing area that you have heard discussed but about which you would like to read a comprehensive summary.
